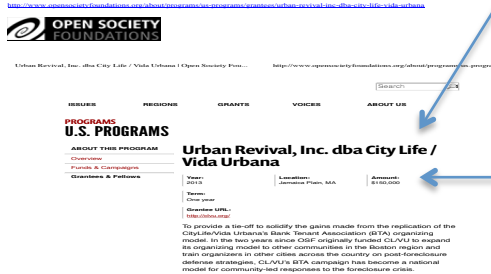


ATTENTION ACTIVISTS

DO YOU AGREE?

It's impossible to solve a problem at the root without **explicitly** aiming to do so.

The Big Problem at the root of all of the problems that progressive organizations try to solve is that we live under a dictatorship of the rich. The Big Solution is to remove the rich from power and have real, not fake, democracy with no rich and no poor. But virtually none of our progressive organizations advocate the Big Solution explicitly.

We in PDRBoston wondered why don't progressive organizations advocate ending forever the dictatorship of the rich by removing the rich from power to have real not fake democracy with no rich and no poor—what we call egalitarian revolution. We discovered there are two reasons:

1. The members and leaders of progressive organizations believe (wrongly) that if their organization advocated egalitarian revolution it would lose public support. (The truth is the opposite, and the evidence for this is at PDRBoston.org.)
2. Virtually all progressive organizations with a paid staff receive funding from Big Money. The leaders, if not the members, know that the organization would lose this funding if it called for removing the rich from power.

Good News!

We don't need Big Money funding, because those who want to remove the rich from power VASTLY outnumber the rich. The great majority of Americans would LOVE for there to be an egalitarian revolution, contrary to what many activists and progressive groups' leaders might think. What we need right now is for those who support egalitarian revolution to KNOW that they are the VAST MAJORITY of Americans and to gain the confidence to start acting like it. But when even progressive organizations refuse to express the goal of removing the rich from power it makes the public feel hopeless, thinking that maybe nobody supports that goal except possibly a very tiny minority.
